Editorial from the Chair



A warm welcome to this Spring edition of the RSCP newsletter. Also, a particular welcome to our three new Lay Members, Neelam, Hazel and Cerrie. It is great to have you join the Partnership and bring with you your experience, challenge and local knowledge.

I'm sure you share my

feeling that there is so much going on in relation to safeguarding children currently. We have the pending Child Wellbeing and Schools Bill going through parliament, the continued implementation of the DfE Families First for Children Pathfinder which is moving onto phase 2 and also beginning work on our new priorities 2025 – 2026.

Amongst other things, we are going to be focusing on national reports published by the Child Safeguarding Practice Review (CSPR) Panel on child sexual abuse in the familial environment, and race and racism in safeguarding. We also have the learning to be taken forward from our our own recent Child Safeguarding Practice Review (CSPR) 'Zara' which is due to be published this summer, and a Local Learning Review.

We are also anticipating that there will be various actions to take forward following analysis of the recent S11 multi-agency audit and will be looking at where the RSCP can support agencies and the children and families workforce.

There is also work for us to do in implementing the specific points from the recently published nonstatutory guidance on the Pathfinder which is aimed at Safeguarding Children Partnerships. It was really pleasing to hear that the implementation has gone so well to date and a big thank you to all partners involved for great joint working to get this off the ground, and who are now sharing their knowledge, experience and learning with other local areas that are earlier in their implementation journey. Well done all!

Do check the discussions at the last RSCP meeting which took place on 28 April and are reviewed by our Independent Scrutineer on <u>page 2</u>.

Finally, I am aware that we are working in challenging times, with a number of professionals and agencies struggling with uncertainty. My special thank you for keeping up your commitment to safeguarding the children of Redbridge.

Summary of items discussed at the last RSCP meeting

In addition to the presentations and discussions mentioned in the <u>Editorial</u>, the RSCP received the following updates and information.

The RSCP received the end of year position for the 2024 - 2025 priorities.

- 1. Contextual Safeguarding Over the course of the year achievements included the ongoing strengthening and embedding of the Youth Intelligence Hub development of resources and support.
- 2. Child Mental Health The Task and Finish Group made several recommendations to be taken forward by the placed based partnership and NELFT.
- 3. A Suitable Home for Every Child The presentation covered the restructure of the LBR Housing Service, an update on housing strategies and policies, wait times on social housing, new ways of working, housing outcomes, including how safeguarding alerts are processed.

Update on Missing Persons Arrangements The police representative outlined arrangements for missing persons which included information on the drivers for **change, challenges, the new model, and staffing, advising that the 'go live' date was** October 2025. It is anticipated that the new arrangements will improve how the service identifies and assesses risk and how it responds when children are reported missing.

RSCP Children with Disabilities Protocol Work has been taking place to review the existing protocol. The Redbridge Safeguarding Partnership (RSCP) recognises that the presence of a disability increases the vulnerability of children to abuse and neglect. The prevised Protocol (May 2025) is now available on the <u>RSCP website</u>.

DfE Families First for Children Pathfinder Update The latest update included the Multi-Agency Referral Form (MARF) is now an on-line form which has received positive **feedback**. **Pre and post birth Family Help Team is the next to go 'live'. The presentation** outlined further detail of the Multi-Agency Child Protection Team (MACPT) with responsibility for core, statutory child protection functions -

Lead Child Protection Practitioner-co-work with lead practitioner in Family Help to lead Independent Child Protection Conference (IPCP)

Specialist Child Protection Health Practitioner - advise on health, mental health and wellbeing issues, expertise and time to identify actual or likely significant harm, drawing on network of health colleagues, including GPs, for further advice.

Education Child Protection specialist - brings key education insights to the team, accessing key information from education and childcare providers, crucial to our **understanding of child's experiences**

Child Protection Police Officers Review all Child Protection, collaborating with MASH, CAIT & CSU colleagues

Priority 1

Responding to national Child Safeguarding Practice Review (CSPR) Panel reports

The national CSPR Panel has recently published two very important reports:

- I Wanted Them All To Notice: Protecting children and responding to child sexual abuse within the faily environment, November 2024.
- It's Silent: Race, Racism and Safeguarding Children, March 2025.

The RSCP will be considering the findings and learning from these and planning relevant actions to take forward the learning locally.



Priority **2**

Learning from Case Reviews and responding to Section 11

Our local case reviews, including a Local Learning Reviews and Local Child Safeguarding Practice Review, from the past six months, have provided key areas for learning and development which we will be looking to develop into action plans in order to take the learning into local policy and practice.



Priority 3

Responding to non-statutory guidance DfE The Families Partnership Programme Guide, March 2025

The DfE Families First For Children Pathfinder in Redbridge is now entering phase 2 of implementation. As announced by the Government. DfE guidance **The Families First Partnership (FFP) Programme Guide**, published in March 2025, outlines delivery expectations for safeguarding partners in England which will be taken forward during the year, overseen by the RSCP.

Our Spring Term is seeing a good uptake from professionals, updating their knowledge and skills and sharing a learning environment with their multi-agency colleagues. However, in these busy times, we know it can be difficult to step away from front-line practice. The latest version of <u>Working Together to</u> <u>Safeguard Children, 2023 (WT23)</u>, emphasises the contribution of multi-agency training to a collective understanding and identification of the new and emerging forms of harm to children. Ofsted inspections of Local Authority Children's Services have found the best local safeguarding arrangements have training as a contributing factor to an environment where multi-agency practice flourishes. Keeping Children Safe in Education, 2024 (KCSIE24), also requires schools and colleges to engage in continual professional development, reinforcing the importance of collaborative learning.

This year we have been updating our programme with the recent findings from the <u>Child Safeguarding</u> <u>Practice Review Panel Annual Report</u>, which provides an analysis of multi-agency practice within the 330 rapid reviews of serious incidents. We have also been reflecting in our training delivery on the importance of partnership and communication this year, the 25th anniversary of the death of Victoria Climbie. Courses have also been adapted to consider emerging legislative changes such as the <u>Children's</u> <u>Wellbeing and Schools Bill</u> and the and <u>Crime and Policing Bill</u> which includes measures on mandatory reporting. We have also been supporting the borough by raising awareness of the new online referral form, <u>Request for Safeguarding and Protection</u>. Recent studies continue to find safeguarding training significantly improves staff confidence in identifying and reporting concerns. Multi-agency training also increases the likelihood of professionals making accurate referrals, leading to faster interventions and reduced harm.

Busy schedules may mean that you miss some dates on our training, so professionals working with **Redbridge families can also benefit from the RSCP's partnership with the** <u>London Safeguarding Children</u> <u>Training Programme</u> with lots of free online briefings. In particular, important changes have been made to the chapters on Bullying, Domestic Abuse and Information and Communications Technology Based Forms of Abuse.
