Intrafamilial Child Sexual Abuse (ICSA)



Background

Intra-familial child sexual abuse refers to child sexual abuse (CSA) that occurs within a family environment. Abusers may or may not be related to the child, however, for the victim, the perpetrator feels like family. This form of abuse may be particularly traumatic because it involves high levels of betrayal, stigma and secrecy.

ICSA is linked to a range of negative outcomes over the whole of the life course, including poorer physical and mental health, lower income, relationship difficulties and further violence and abuse. The severity of the long term harm depends on the nature and duration of the abuse, the individual's coping mechanisms, and the support they receive.
